With great appreciation and an enthusiasm for what we can achieve together, I look forward to my second and final year as Chair. Thank you for believing in our mission and investing in the future of public education.









Cameras, Careers, and Confidence:

How a Grant is Changing Students' Futures

hat happens when students use the same cameras as Hollywood filmmakers? At Atascocita High School, it's opening doors to college, careers, and even paid commercial gigs.

According to Jeffrey Mack, the audio/video production teacher at Atascocita High School, being able to purchase the Sony FX6 camera has given students the opportunity to take their film content to a new level.

"Before this grant, students were limited to consumer-level cameras which are not tailored for film production. So, it made it challenging to achieve the desired visual aesthetics. Now, they're working with industry-standard tools that are used on the sets of music videos, short films, television programs, and commercials," Mack said.



Because the Sony FX6 mirrors the operating systems of Sony's top-tier cinema cameras used in major film productions, mastery of this technology in high school means students are arriving at college or film sets already fluent in the tools of the trade. Since receiving the camera, students have produced professional-quality videos that have earned tens of thousands of Instagram views, led to paid commercial shoots, and even helped one student land a job with a Houston-based production company.

Students have filmed promotional videos for the City of Humble as well as the Humble Rodeo and are looking forward to elevating the production quality of their "Shattered Dreams" program as well as enhancing their competitiveness in various film contests this coming year. "I feel like our grant project was a huge success and the impact has been wonderful. I'm so grateful to the Foundation because without this grant there's no way we could get this equipment into the hands of the students. We are excited to use our grant to help, not only our school, but our district and the surrounding community," Mack said.

Caden Kesner, an incoming senior at Atascocita High School, will be starting his fourth year as a student in Mack's audio/visual program. A self-proclaimed "camera nerd," he had researched the Sony FX6 and says, "At first, I was intimidated to use such an expensive, professional camera, but once I mastered it, the difference was incredible—sharper, clearer images that looked truly professional," he said.

Since using this equipment, Kesner's skills have become so impressive that a Houston production company hired him to work on commercial and social media projects. Kesner said he is grateful he had the



opportunity to learn to use the Sony FX6 while in high school because it prepared him to comfortably handle the different cameras he's required to utilize at his current job.

The success of this program shows how one grant can ripple far beyond a single classroom. Thanks to the Foundation's support, Atascocita High School students aren't just learning about film—they're already making their mark in it.

The Dream That Took Flight In Humble:

The Maria Hernandez Story



nce upon a time, there was a little girl who discovered the universe inside a book. She turned its pages slowly, her mind racing with questions, wondering about the mysteries of life: gravity, light, black holes, the unknown. All wonders that would captivate her heart and never let go. She read the book again. Then again. And again.

Her name was Maria Hernandez. She was just eight years old, sitting on the floor of her home, holding a book her father had given her. "I remember reading that book over and over again," Maria says, laughing now. "I became obsessed, not just with Isaac Newton, but with space, gravity, and the idea of the universe in general."

But her dreams and reality were different. "When I was a child, I could only look at the stars, but I couldn't aim for them," she says. Where she lived, there were no telescopes, no observatories, no roadmaps to NASA. Just a little girl and a dream too big for her, or so she thought. Still, she held on to that hope.

That little girl grew up and went to college. She enrolled in biomedical engineering. "My dad wanted me to pick something that made money," she explains. "But I wasn't happy." It felt like a compromise. NASA sometimes recruited biomedical engineers, and the field seemed more practical to her parents. But this quickly changed. Maria and her family had to move to Houston, the heart of NASA.

After a short pause in education, Maria enrolled at Lone Star College to pursue a nursing degree. "I've never wanted to be a nurse," she admits. "But I wanted to make my parents happy and study something that would make a little bit more money."

While pursuing her nursing degree, came the class that changed everything. It was an elective, taken online, called Stars and Galaxies. "I have always been passionate about space, so I had to take it." One day, her professor invited the class to the Insperity Observatory in Humble ISD. And of course, Maria HAD to go. "We saw Saturn," she says, her smile wide at the memory. "I couldn't believe it. I had been seeing movies and stuff like that, but I had never even seen a telescope in real life. I was mesmerized."



She stayed late asking questions and talking with the Insperity Observatory Director, Dr. Aaron Clevenson. For the first time in a long time, she realized that maybe her dream wasn't so impossible after all. That same night, she wrote an email to her professor. She needed to meet for advice. "I told her I thought I wanted to change my major," Maria says. "She told me, 'I noticed. You are really passionate about space."

A week later, her godfather reached out. A quiet man who rarely called, he surprised Maria with questions. What was she studying? Was she happy? Was she sure? Then he shared something deeply personal. The greatest regret of his life, he said, was not doing what made him happy. Then he asked, "What makes you happy?" Maria looked around her bedroom full of posters of space and galaxies. She didn't think twice. "NASA," she shouts. "I have always wanted to work at NASA."

His response was simple: "Then what are you doing with your life?" Maria took those words to heart.

Right after, she walked over to her sister's house, nervous but ready to say out loud what she had only dared to dream. She wanted to follow her lifelong dream and study astrophysics. Her sister, twelve years older, had always been more like a second mother. "When I told her, she smiled. I think the fact that I was finally choosing to be happy made her happy too."

The final step was telling her parents. "I thought it was going to be a big deal," Maria admits. "But when I told them, my dad started crying. I was like, ok, here we go. But he was crying because he was really happy."



From that moment on, everything changed. Maria became a regular at the Insperity Observatory in Humble ISD. The very same place that gave her direction, confidence, and the courage to go after her lifelong dream. "The fact that I had the chance to come here and mess with the telescopes and ask questions, I discovered that I could pursue astrophysics. I could get a PhD, study black holes, and do whatever I want. It took a lot of people believing in me and having a place where I could see all the things I dreamed about in one tiny lens."

Many dreams, discoveries, and "aha" moments continue to happen at the very place that changed Maria's life. The Insperity Observatory was built thanks to two years of dedicated fundraising by the Humble ISD Education Foundation. The idea came from a group of passionate science teachers who submitted a proposal through a special one-time grant opportunity called "The Big Idea." Their vision was bold: to build an observatory on school district property, and the Foundation rallied behind it to make it a reality.



Since opening in 2009, the observatory has become more than a learning tool. It's a space where students, families, and community members come face to face with the universe, through a telescope and with their own eyes. "There's nothing more powerful than seeing it for yourself," says Dr. Aaron Clevenson, Insperity Observatory Director. "It becomes real. And I think it's just incredible what this place has done for the district, for the community, and for everyone who has come to visit."









Investing In Teachers, Inspiring Students:

117 Educator Scholarships and Counting

hen teachers grow, students thrive. And thanks to the continued partnership between the Humble Area Retired Teachers Association (HARTA) and the Humble ISD Education Foundation, 22 educators were able to do that this past year.

Since the program began in 2016, 117 Humble ISD educators have received scholarships to pursue advanced degrees, professional development, and alternative certifications - investments that directly strengthen classroom learning.

Jill Honeycutt, a Pre-K Teacher at Elm Grove Elementary, used her scholarship to attend an Al workshop for educators, learning how to create personalized social stories that help students practice new social skills.

"Social stories that can be purchased online are often generic. Using AI, I can input the specific needs of my students and the platform will create a social story that is tailored to our exact needs. I can export the story into a document and add photographs of our class as the illustrations and then create a book that we use in class to learn and practice new skills. This is especially important in reaching my students with special needs because they are able to literally see themselves in the story and that helps them learn and apply new concepts and behaviors more readily," Honeycutt said.




Honeycutt said she was very excited to learn she had received the scholarship because she tries to take a class every year to help her grow as a teacher.

"Receiving the grant not only made me feel supported in my educational journey, but it gave me a boost of confidence to try something new and just a little intimidating! I am so thankful for this opportunity because it helped me grow as a teacher. In fact, I was so excited about what I learned that I came back and taught a Professional Development course on AI for the teachers on my campus and then presented it again during summer for the Early Childhood department," she said.

Like Honeycutt, Atascocita High School Social Studies Teacher, Evan de la Haye used his scholarship to push his own learning—and inspire his students to do the same. De la Haye was awarded a scholarship last year toward completing his Master's Degree at Sam Houston State University. He began that journey in 2021 and graduated in 2025.

"Working with high school seniors, I was always encouraging them to have goals and to strive to achieve greater things. After saying that for so long, I decided that I needed to live by example and do the same. That's when I went back to school," he said.

Going back to school was a humbling experience for de la Haye, as he was reminded how it felt to be a student again. He realized, in looking to his professors for guidance, that his students were looking to him as well. This inspired him to become the best instructor that he possibly could and to model for his students what an

A Scholarship That Changed Everything The Lorelei Spears Story

hen Lorelei Spears sat down to complete her scholarship application through the Humble ISD Education Foundation, she expected a list of endless questions. Instead, she found something unexpected: a place to tell her story. "It made me feel like a person," she said. "Not just a GPA score. For the first time, I felt like someone cared and wanted to hear who I was as a person."

That moment was more than just a turning point in the application process, it was a turning point for Lorelei. "When I was awarded a scholarship, it gave me confidence," she said. "It told me that I mattered." She is thankful for the wonderful teachers that helped her along the way and prepared her for college classes. She said, "Humble ISD prepared me to excel in my classes and it spilled over into college. I received Honors and STEM scholarships."

The scholarship helped her more than financially; it helped her believe in her future. With her renewed confidence and sense of value, Lorelei carefully mapped out her college path of becoming a nurse. Rather than take on overwhelming debt, she chose to attend Lone Star College for her first two years. She proudly graduated in May 2025 with honors and an Applied Science Associate degree. Now, she is transferring to her dream school in the fall: Texas Women's University. She will graduate in May 2027. Her decision was strategic and bold.

"If I hadn't planned it out, it would have cost me over \$80,000 to get the same degree with the same classes at a local university," she said. "Now, I am transferring to Texas Women's University with no college debt. The scholarship I received from the Education Foundation helped pay for all my books." Lorelei's goal is to earn a BSN in Nursing and become a Pediatric Nurse. She helps fund her college expenses by working as an art teacher during the summers at Cordovan Art School teaching five-year olds how to create art. Her path forward is clear, thoughtful, and full of purpose. And it all started with a scholarship that made her feel seen and gave her confidence to map out a plan for her future.



Lorelei's story is one of many that have been shared by Foundation scholarship recipients through the years, and is what motivates the Foundation to continually expand the scholarship program. In fact, when the program began in 2009, only two scholarships were offered. This past year, more than 80 different scholarships were awarded to graduating seniors, totaling more than \$318,000 awarded in May 2025!

One of the reasons for this growth is the increasing number of local organizations choosing to partner with the district to offer scholarships. Parent groups such as PTAs, PTOs, and booster clubs have found the Foundation's streamlined process to be both efficient and trustworthy, making it easier than ever to set up and administer

scholarships. By working with these groups to streamline the application, selection, and disbursement processes, the Foundation reduces the administrative burden on these groups while ensuring consistency and fairness across the board. This collaboration not only encourages more community involvement, but also creates more opportunities for students of all backgrounds to be recognized and supported. As word spreads about how easy it is to participate in the program, more donors are stepping forward each year, fueling a cycle of generosity that benefits students and strengthens the bonds between the Foundation, Humble ISD schools, and their communities.



create opportunities for every Humble ISD student for the next 25 years and beyond. Here's to the next 25 years of making a difference TOGETHER.
































Traditions of Giving
